

Advising the Nation's Policy Leaders


ISW's analysts have shaped the discourse in the broader policy community with incisive commentary.










ISW Hertog War Studies Program

ISW convened the Hertog War Studies Winter Advanced Program, an intensive five-day course on the ideology of ISIS and al Qaeda. The program focused on the study of the sources for these groups' behavior as a requirement for thinking about how to combat them. ISW President Dr. Kimberly Kagan, AEI Critical Threats Project Director Frederick Kagan, and General John Allen (U.S.M.C., ret.) led the course for 27 students who previously attended the Summer Hertog War Studies Program.

The Hertog War Studies Programs are central to ISW's mission to prepare the next generation of national security leaders for defending and advancing America's interests.
